



Transportation and Warehousing (NAICS 48-49)

The Transportation and Warehousing sector includes industries providing transportation of passengers and cargo, warehousing and storage for goods, scenic and sightseeing transportation, and support activities related to modes of transportation. Establishments in these industries use transportation equipment or transportation related facilities as a productive asset. The type of equipment depends on the mode of transportation. The modes of transportation are air, rail, water, road, and pipeline.

In 2012 there were 216,400 Illinois workers employed in the transportation and warehousing industry.

32 fatal injuries occurred in the Illinois transportation and warehousing industry in 2012.

2012 Nonfatal Injury Facts

Transportation and Warehousing

69.7% of injured workers were male.

45-54 year olds was the most common age group with reported injury (24%).

Rates of injury were highest in businesses' with 1000+ workers (8.3).

Air transportation had the highest rates of nonfatal injury or illness (9.8).

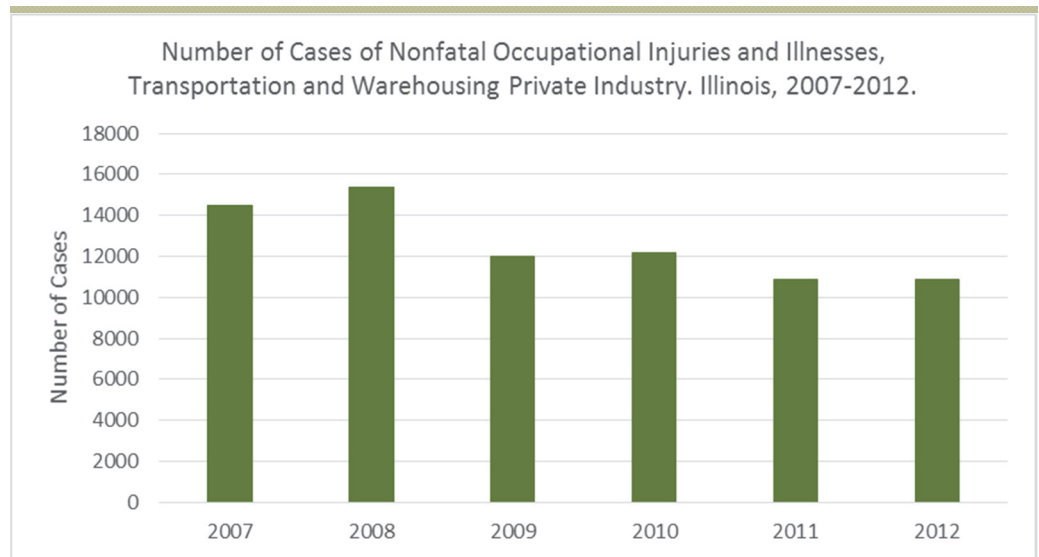
The back was the most common affected body part. (n=3140)

The most common injury was sprains, strains, and tears (n=5720).
